No ideology, market, state, machine, party, church, expert, mob, or leader is allowed to stand above human dignity.

Grounding Principles

1. I am not God.

2. I am not above anyone.

3. Everything else is subject to debate.

Core Belief

Human beings should live under systems that protect equal dignity, responsible agency, truth-seeking, non-domination, and peaceful correction. No single ideology is sovereign. Every tool must prove that it helps people live without desperation, cruelty, or needless violence.

What This Means

Freedom matters. Responsibility must travel with it.

Compassion matters.

Accountability must travel with it.

Property matters. It must not become domination.

Government matters. It must not become a god.

Markets matter.

They must not become the final moral judge.

Community matters.

A state cannot love, a market cannot forgive, and an algorithm cannot sit with grief.

The Dignity Boundary

No person may be reduced to a tool, statistic, enemy category, burden, vote, labor unit, or disposable life. Any system that requires dehumanization to function has already failed.

The Practical Rule

Use the smallest decent tool that solves the real problem. Centralize only when necessary. Decentralize whenever sufficient. Preserve room for conscience, correction, debate, and repair.

The Civic Boundary

Argue, build, compete, worship, dissent, own, organize, persuade, and leave. But do not dehumanize, enslave, exterminate, or place any ideology above correction.

How Systems Should Be Judged

- Does it preserve dignity?
- Does it reduce needless suffering?
- Does it restrain concentrated power?
- Does it leave peaceful ways to correct itself?
- Does it help people remain human?
